Westbank Museum and Arts and Crafts Society Celebrates 40 Years

When Clare Small and his wife Billie moved to Westbank in 1952, the population was only 600 people; however, the small town had a lot of history worth preserving. By the mid-1970s, Westbank's history was vanishing; heritage buildings and businesses were being torn down to make way for strip malls. Clare, a fruit farmer and former manager of the Westbank Irrigation District, refused to see his community's history disappear any longer.

In 1978, the Small family founded the Westbank Museum and Arts and Crafts Society. Clare donated a portion of his property for the purpose of a museum, and its construction began in 1979. In 1982, Bill Bennett, the premier at the time, cut the ribbon to officially open the Westbank Museum! From 1990 until his death in 2004, Clare and his daughter Margaret Jackson operated the museum with the support of a Board of Directors and summer students.

Westbank, and the Westbank Museum, have grown a lot in 40 years! By 2011, the museum was running out of space, so Margaret proposed the museum move to a new location. The old RCMP auxiliary building was scheduled for demolition, but the City granted the space to the museum. Staff and volunteers carefully packed up each artifact from the old museum and transported it to the new location at 2376 Dobbin Road.

Since the move, the Museum has had several special additions. Driving south on highway 97, when you pass the museum, you can catch a glimpse of an old truck on the roof. It is a 1936 farm Ford Pickup that worked in the McKinley Landing area, and was previously owned by a man nicknamed “Klondike Mike”. Many people desired the truck, so Klondike Mike reportedly had it chained to a tree. His son inherited the truck and sold it to Richard and Poppy Angus, who owned Rutland Auto Wreckers at the time. Their dream was to fix up the old truck, but it languished on their property in a bush for years until Poppy suggested putting the truck on the roof of the museum. They weighed the truck to make sure the building could support it, then used a crane to lift it onto the roof and then had it welded onto a frame. Many folks have asked if the truck is for sale; our answer is, “Sure, if you can get it down!”

In 2012, the museum welcomed the addition of a fur trapper cabin. The Fur Brigade Trail, along which First Nations and Europeans would meet to trade, ran up from the States and right through Westbank! Needing to represent the fur trade in the museum’s collection, Poppy Angus and Katharine Welsh went on a road trip in search of the perfect cabin. They met a man who had an authentic Hudson’s Bay fur trapper cabin; however, he could not part with such a special artifact. They then trekked to Penticton where they met a man who was working on a cabin for a client, when suddenly, the client backed out on the deal. The cabin found its new home beside the museum, and today it is furnished like an authentic trapper cabin from 200 years ago!

The museum is as youthful as ever on its fortieth birthday. What’s our secret? It is the support from our members, Board of Directors, volunteers, staff, the City of West Kelowna, Westbank First Nations, School District 23, and museum patrons. We thank you from the bottom of our hearts for helping us keep our history alive.
