Carmen Clark, who has been with the Museum since February of 2012, intends to raise the profile of the Westbank Museum over the next few years, and encourages locals and visitors to attend the one-year anniversary celebration of the Museum's new location on Saturday, August 18th at 2376 Dobbin Rd. from 2:00 - 4:00 pm. An afternoon of fun, food and festivities is planned including the performing artists The Old Time Fiddlers. As well, there will be a special dedication to Museum founder Clare Small. Of special interest at the Museum is the latest acquisition, the miniature sawmill which is on loan to the Museum from the BC Filers Association. This miniature model—16-feet in length—takes after "the "Jack ladder" type mill that once lined the coast of Vancouver Island, the Fraser River and

the interior waterways of British Columbia. As part of the festivities on August 18th, there will be a saw mill demonstration. The Museum is also working on including two new outbuildings on the property; a Fur Trading Post and a Tool Shed. Carmen regularly welcomes travellers from around the world—including Holland, Tokyo, Germany, Australia,

From the Kitchen Nook: Ice Cream Cake by Rita Pedersen

INGREDIENTS: 24 Oreo Cookies or cookies of your choice, divided; 2 cups strawberry ice cream, softened; 2 cups thawed Cool Whip Whipped Topping or whipped cream with a pinch of tartar, divided; 2 cups chocolate ice cream, softened; 2 Tblsp. chocolate syrup.

PREPARATION: Line 9-inch round pan with plastic wrap. Stand 14 cookies around edge of pan. Crush remaining cookies. Reserve 1/2 cup crumbs; spread remaining crumbs onto bottom of pan. Spread strawberry ice cream over crumbs; top with layers of 1 cup Cool Whip, remaining crumbs and chocolate ice cream. Freeze 4 hours. Remove dessert from freezer 10 minutes before serving. Lift from pan with plastic wrap; discard plastic wrap. Let dessert stand at room temperature until slightly softened. Top with remaining Whipped Topping; drizzle with

chocolate syrup. For a variation top dessert with fresh strawberries, blueberries, or raspberries.

Clare Small and his wife Billee, who owned an orchard on the west end of the Powers Creek 'Fill-in' on the outskirts of Westbank, had a vision. By the mid 1970s many of the heritage houses and some of the businesses downtown were being torn down to make way for new shopping malls and housing developments, and something had to be done to preserve what was left of our local history. Small wanted to donate a half-acre of his farm property for the purpose of establishing a museum. When he presented his proposal to the Regional District of the Okanagan(the governing body for our unincorporated area at the time), the idea was favourably received, but it would take a few more years before it came to fruition.

In the meantime, Small's family formed the Westbank Museum and Arts and Crafts Society in 1978. Clare made a trip to Victoria to visit the provincial museum, where the museum officials advised him to make a request for a Recreational Facilities Assistance Programme grant. This agency provided up to one third of the cost of materials to a maximum of \$30,000. This grant was in addition to the Young Canada Works grant that provided the labour to build the concrete block building to house the artifacts. However, there

was a glitch in the approval process, as the half-acre of land had to be removed from the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). That did not occur until December 1980. As expected, there were further delays and finally, Mr. Small was permitted to sell the half-acre plot the Westbank Museum and Arts and Crafts Society for the nominal sum of \$1.00. The building construction had actually begun previously, in June of 1979 and stopped over the winter months. The cornerstone of the concrete block building was laid on June 16th, 1979. Sealed in the stone was a copy of the Certificate of Incorporation for the society, plans for the building, a copy of the second edition of 'A Bit of Okanagan History' by Dorothy Gellatly and copies of our local newspapers.

On Thursday, July 15th, 1982 Premier Bill Bennett cut the symbolic ribbon and declared the museum open. The premier praised Mr. and Mrs. Small for their insight in providing this facility for the Westbank residents to enjoy, and will become more valued with the passing of time. Clare's dream finally came true! There was now a repository for the artifacts of Westbank's early history, a meeting place to serve the local arts and crafts groups, a community cultural center for arts and trades displays, collections of local school history projects and future programs of Westbank's cultural history. Clare and his wife continued to operate the museum until 1990, when the burden of running the museum became too great for him. Billee's health was failing and he spent a lot of his time caring for her. Clare asked his daughter Margaret Jackson for help. She, like her father, was passionate about vintage memorabilia and volunteered as the secretary, kept minutes of the meetings and did the paperwork. She graduated from Okanagan College in 1978, one of the first graduates from the arts program there. She packed her bags to work in Medicine Hat, Alberta and did accounting work for an electrical contractor. Later she managed an insurance company. Margaret made a life decision and moved back home to take over the museum full time. She also bought a personal tax and financial services business that processed 1200 tax returns a year. As a volunteer she initiated a number of community projects of which her board was very supportive. One of the more popular projects was establishing a video library of the local pioneers. A change in local government resulted in reduced funding for the museum. To make the museum user-friendlier for both the new operator and guests, the Westbank museum received a complete makeover. The future of this valuable community resource was up in the air, and in the interim the facility was kept open for the public to enjoy. Margaret was committed, "Moving back home to raise my son in the same environment I grew up in," Margaret says, "was the best thing I have ever done."

An appeal to our local District of West Kelowna council resulted in an opportunity that resulted in a better museum facility with greater public exposure. Not only do the Westbank Museum Arts and Crafts Society provide a window into our local community's past, but also the new facility provides valuable information to the many tourists that pass through or stay to visit our many attractions. Clare Small would be amazed to see what his dream has become! Come visit the Westbank Museum on Saturday, August 18th, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. to help commemorate the first anniversary of the museum in their new facility!
