Hattie Webber, Keeper of her Husband's Family History. Pt. 2

Once the irrigation flume in Glenrosa was completed around 1944, the water from Powers Creek flowed to provide the lifeblood of the orchards. After Douglas and Harriet Webber were married on March 15th, 1944, Douglas planted their first trees. Fourteen acres of apples with a few cherry trees were planted on their property. Doug and George Irwin's father, John, gave



them 12 and 10 acres, respectively. George's property was located on a parcel of land on the eastern part of where Scottstown Road is today. Those first trees were planted there.

The couple lived in a cabin on the home property on Webber Road. They had four children, Raymond, Rodney, Connie and Christine.

Until the trees matured, which took ten years for the bigger trees, the family grew crops of tomatoes and potatoes to help provide much-needed income. Many of the family members pitched in to help reap the harvest.

Fruit farming became a full-time job for Doug, even though he continued logging as he had always done. While Doug was away logging in various parts of the Okanagan Valley, sometimes for weeks at a time, Hattie looked after the orchard. It was hard work moving sprinklers, picking the fruit and moving boxes, especially when the family did not have a tractor in those early years. Their old grey Ford pickup performed yeoman service and Hattie longed for Raymond and Rodney to reach driving age so that they could help deliver the ripe cherries, prunes and apples to the packinghouse!

In 1960 Doug and Hattie built their home on their property at the intersection of Glenrosa and McIver Roads. Norm and Marian Fenton built their house for them. Doug would continually supervise its construction to ensure that their home would be built according to his specifications.

During the mid 1960s, John and Bertha retired. The couple celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary on April 19th, 1970. Bertha passed away a short while later. John then moved to downtown Westbank, near the Highway Gospel Hall to live with his daughter Freda and later with Ethel Truant until he died in 1976. Meanwhile, Doug and his youngest son Rodney expanded their logging business. They eventually acquired sixteen logging trucks along with other associated equipment and were engaged in logging operations in many parts of B.C. Hattie faithfully kept the company books until the computer age arrived around 1998, then their daughter Connie took over.

The Glenrosa landscape was also changing. Orchards were being replaced with housing developments and by 1994, 50 years after the family had planted their first fruit trees, the last of them were uprooted. Three schools, two elementary and one middle, were built on John and Bertha's original property. The largest ten acre parcel remaining belonged to Douglas and Rodney. It was here that they had their shop and storage area to park their logging trucks. Doug still came in to the shop at age 79 to change those heavy tires on the logging trucks. "He had it down to a science." Hattie explained, "His technique required little physical effort." Doug always liked to keep in touch with the business.

In 2004 Doug and Hattie invited the community to help celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary. The event was held at the Holiday Inn Express Hotel in Westbank. Many longtime friends, members from the Highway Gospel Hall, the church they attended, and relatives helped celebrate their milestone anniversary. They celebrated one more wedding anniversary together and on November 30th, 2005 Douglas passed away. Rod continues to operate the logging company to this day, now with ten trucks and ten employees. Hattie recently moved from her home on Glenrosa Road in July 2016, and now resides at the Village of Smith Creek Seniors Centre.
