Pictured above, Gillian is seen dismantling—for the last time—the gas kiln brick door that helps to protect and seal pottery pieces within the kiln when they are being fired with those 2000-degree swirling, bending, whooshing flames that creep and meander in and around the shelves and their guests, morphing chalky-looking containers painstakingly-thrown and intricately-drawn into brilliantly-coloured pieces of clay art. From her store's display units, Gillian's pottery has travelled to homes around the world and will have graced many a mantle-piece, coffee table, kitchen island and glass cabinet.

In 1984, Gillian and her pottery partner Elaine Hughes-Games established the Westbank Pottery Studio. After 10 years, Elaine moved on to other endeavours and Gillian continued to operate the pottery business. One of Gillian's oldest decorative themes the tree and ladder— evident on many of her pottery pieces, stems back to her family background of fruit farming which began many years ago when her parents, Henry and Sheila Paynter, took on the daunting challenge of growing fruit. And so, it's not surprising that, even though a new tenant will be taking Gillian's place, she is delighted to welcome them(Buckerfields)—a farming business—to Paynter's Market as the new face on the block. Buckerfields plan to open sometime in early 2011.

As a friend, family member, and employee of Gillian's for the past 16 years, I have come to know her exacting ways from the detailed packing, wrapping, and parceling of gifts to unparalleled customer service which regularly included a tour of her gallery, workshop and kiln rooms; a speed lecture on kiln-firing procedures; a synopsis of other artists in the valley; directions to anywhere in the country; and, a gracious escort out the door with a wave and a "Have a Good Day." # Bridge toll fees were cost prohibitive for Westbank Fruit Farmers

In July 1958 when the Okanagan Lake Bridge first was opened a toll was charged for vehicles crossing the bridge from Westbank to Kelowna. The \$4.50 fee that was levied to travel one-way with their truck laded with fruit surprised Heinz Zdralek(pictured on the left with his 1920s irrigation pump) and his father Englebert! Formerly, a book of truck tickets to cross the lake by ferry cost fifteen cents for each trip! This was a very crucial time for their

family as they were producing a lot of fruit, especially peaches. Heinz remarked. "That hit hard then. My father and I sat down and figured it out real quick." He continued. "We switched from hauling our fruit from our orchard in Casa Loma to the Kelowna Growers Exchange (K.G.E.) packing house, where we normally took our fruit, and now trucked it to the Westbank Co-op."

The Kelowna packinghouses naturally complained bitterly that they were no longer getting their business. Many local people relied on the packinghouses for their employment and now with less fruit coming from those Westbank orchards, the K.G.E. required fewer workers. The Zdraleks retorted. "Well smarten those people up!" Meaning, talk to those politicians responsible for implementing the Okanagan Lake Bridge toll fee structure and ask if it can be changed to make it fair for truckers. However, it wasn't until April 1st, 1963 that the bridge toll fees were finally eliminated.

Later the K.G.E. contacted Heinz and his father and asked them if they would reconsider sending them their fruit now that the bridge tolls were removed. "No," they replied. "We are happy where we are taking our fruit." The Zdralek family continued to take their fruit to the Westbank Co-op until they stopped fruit farming and went into hay production.




