Seeking Buried Treasure on the Okanagan Fur Brigade Trail

Metal detecting has been a hot topic in the news lately, including stories about detecting enthusiasts, known as “detectorists”, finding long-lost rings and returning them to their grateful owners. When I took up the hobby 2 years ago, I was particularly interested in unearthing objects of historical significance to the area. Recently, I was fortunate to have the opportunity to search an area that may have been located on the historic Okanagan Fur Brigade Trail.

I met Blair Jean, a descendant of the Gellatly family, while working at the Westbank Museum. Blair is a history enthusiast and, coincidentally, owns a metal detector! He was having trouble operating it so I connected him with the Okanagan Treasure Hunters Club, whose members are passionate about metal detecting. In exchange, Blair gave an enthralling presentation to our club about the history of Westbank. He generously invited us to detect on his property, which he believes may have been part of the Okanagan Fur Brigade Trail.

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The Fur Brigade Trail was a major travel route that ran from Fort Okanogan in Washington to Fort Alexandria, north of Quesnel. It also ran along the west side of Okanagan Lake. The trail became mostly obsolete after 1846, and many parts of it have disappeared due to decades of logging and development, making it difficult to pinpoint where it actually was. However, some sections of the trail that have been identified remain as they did 200 years ago.

Located near Bear Creek, Blair's property contains a field that could have made an ideal rest stop along the trail. On a rainy Sunday in August, me and a small team of detectorists embarked on a hunt of Blair's property in hopes of finding evidence the trail passed through there. When we arrived, we were greeted enthusiastically by Blair's faithful guard dog, Foxy. Foxy is a delightful little Pomeranian, but has the spirit of a dog three times her size. Blair led us through the forest to a clearing that would be our detecting site. An old cabin, faded and crumbling with age, still stood on the site. It was exciting knowing that we were possibly detecting on the trail that was traveled hundreds of years ago by First Nations people, fur traders, European explorers, early settlers, and prospectors.

As soon as we turned on our detectors, they signalled that there were a lot of metal objects beneath our feet. I knelt down and dug and discovered a small bullet shell casing. As the day progressed, we had varying success, finding scrap metal, bottle caps, a bronze Dom Perignon Champagne menu holder that somebody had clearly used for shooting practice. The most intriguing find was a hair barrette found by Brian. The barrette looks like it is from the Victorian era, but we are still awaiting information on what period it is from. It is bow shaped with an intricate vine design. In the centre of the barrette is a circular frame that looks like it once held a jewel or a cameo. The barrette, though it has become green after being lost underground for so long, is still beautiful.



While we did not find any significant evidence that the fur brigade trail ran through where we detected, we are very grateful that Blair let us detect on his property. Detectorists have had great luck searching in other historical sites within Westbank; just weeks earlier, Blair, Brett and Brian uncovered a horseshoe where the old Billy Powers cabin stood in the 1800s. It was likely forged at the Gellatly Blacksmith shop. It just goes to show that history is all around us – even underneath our feet!
