


Mille Fleurs keep their distance!




The old saying, "birds of a feather flock together" couldn't be more true when it comes to the mille fleurs pictured above at a small Westbank farm. The

flecked-feathered banties(petite-sized chickens), rarely seen apart, keep to themselves and enjoy company from afar; hence, the advantage of a telephoto lens! Generally, mille fleurs are not prolific egg-layers; in fact, they are not even onoccasion egg-layers, but every six months or so, a mille fleur egg will appear in the laying nest. Eggs, pictured on the right, belong to a mille fleur, a silkie(pictured bottom left) and two



brown laying hens(pictured bottom right). Which chicken laid which egg? And what to do with these eggs? Fry, soft-boil, hard-boil, poach, scramble, prepare an omelette or whip up a batch of—often a favourite at pot-luck dinners— deviled delights by combining and mashing together 12 hard-boiled egg yolks, 1 1/2 tblsp. dijon mustard, 1 1/2 tblsps. mayonnaise, 1/2 tsp. worcestershire sauce and a pinch of salt and black pepper. Fill cooked egg-white



halves with mixture and sprinkle with a choice of paprika, cayenne or powdered garlic and top with either a herb sprig(dill, tarragon, salad burnet), or a halved green or black olive. 




From the Kitchen Nook: Oven-roasted Squash, Apples & Onions by Rita Pedersen

Ingredients: 1 acorn squash, 1/4 cup fig balsamic dressing, 2 tblsp. brown sugar, 1/2 tsp. dried rosemary leaves, 2 apples, cut into 8 wedges each, 1 red onion, cut into 8 wedges. Preparation: HEAT oven to 400°F. PIERCE squash with sharp knife; place on microwaveable plate. Microwave on high 2 min.; cool 2 minutes. Meanwhile, mix dressing, sugar and rosemary until blended. CUT squash length-wise in half; remove and discard seeds. Cut each half into 4 wedges; place in large bowl. Add apples and onions; mix lightly. Add dressing mixture; toss to evenly coat. Spread onto foil-covered rimmed baking sheet. BAKE 30 minutes or until squash is tender, turning after 15 minutes. For added colour, flavour and texture, prepare using a combination of red and green apples, such as McIntosh and Granny Smith. Keeping it Safe—for best results, use a large sturdy sharp knife to pierce and cut the

squash as directed.

Westbank First Nation Celebrates 50 Years! by Gordon H. Ficke

In 1876, before colonization and the implementation of the federal Indian Act, the Okanagan natives or Syilx were an independent, self-sufficient and self-governing people. The various communities in the Okanagan Valley thrived on hunting, fishing, gathering wild berries, medicinal plants, etc. and traded. The Okanagan economy was productive and organized with regulated resource management practices in place. Each area of the valley had an appointed chief. Charlie Sookinchute was the first chief for Westbank. When the federal Indian Act was enacted, the traditional model of government began to disintegrate, as well as the previously accepted ways of the Syilx.

The federal government set aside, through joint federal and provincial commissions, reserves during the late 1800s and early 1900s. Commissioners travelled the length and breadth of Canada, establishing reserve

lands for Indians. When they came through the central Okanagan, the commissioners decided that there should be one reserve established at Mission Creek and two others on the west side of Okanagan Lake. Unfortunately, the local natives had no say in the matter. In the ensuing years reserve commissions would reduce the size of these lands. Barbara Coble the Self-government Implementation Coordinator for Westbank First Nation (WFN) has a long history in Westbank. Her grandmother and mother were from here. Her father was American and her and a sister were born in California, while her brother and another sister were born in Canada. The family travelled frequently back and forth across the Canada/U.S.A. border.

Barbara researched the history regarding the formation of Westbank First Nation for their 50th anniversary this year. "The reserves at Westbank and Kelowna were part of the Okanagan Indian Band, located near Vernon, B.C. In the early 1960s there were approximately 170 band members living on the Westbank. The chief and council were from the Vernon area. The band members here were not happy with the representation they were getting from Vernon and their interests and concerns were not being addressed," Coble stated. "Back then very few members had cars and none of them had telephones, so there was very little interaction between the two communities." The distance between the two communities of Westbank and Vernon in those days was an obstacle. As well, the two communities were quite different. "The Westbank band members were kind of left on their own, even though they were part of the Okanagan Indian Band," Barbara declared. "They were looking at some economic development opportunities as well, but nothing could be done because of the lack of representation." A small group of Westbank members said, "We should do something about this." The idea of forming their own band came up. Consequently, a committee was struck of Westbank members that included Norman Lindley, Ted Derrickson, Margaret Derrickson, Mary Anne Eli, Francis Swite and Bert Wilson. They began the process of separation from the Okanagan Indian Band. On October 18th, 1963, the division became official and the Westbank Indian Band was formed. "During my research, I could not find anything recorded that there was a special ceremony to commemorate this historic event," Coble revealed. "The reason was that they were a very poor community, so public celebrations weren't a big thing." Interestingly, the vote to form a new band actually failed, by a few votes. However, the Indian agent at the time thought it best to allow the Westbank band, in their best interests, to separate. Because there were so few members here and quite a few members in Vernon, the Vernon members did not care one way or another if the Westbank members decided to separate and therefore only a few of them turned out to vote. Westbank lands were designated Tsinstikeptum Indian Reserve numbers 9 and 10, and Mission Creek Indian Reserve number 8. Norman Lindley was the first elected chief for Westbank, along with councillors Margaret and Harry Derrickson.

"For the 50th anniversary public celebration this year we set aside the afternoon on Saturday, September 21st at our outdoor pavilion," Coble enthused. "We had a pig roast, games, music and showed a video that depicts our history. It was a really fun day, celebrating our accomplishments in our community!" Around 300 people attended. On October 18th, Westbank First Nation had a banquet style community dinne that was held indoors to acknowledge that this was the official day WFN was established 50 years ago!" Today there are almost 800 Westbank bank band members.
