From the Kitchen Nook: Vegy Burgers by Rita Pedersen

INGREDIENTS: * 2/3 cup (150 mL) quick cooking rolled oats, (not instant), * 3 tbsp (45 mL) vegetable oil, * 1 onion, diced, * 2 cloves garlic, chopped, * 1 tsp (5 mL) dried thyme, * 1/4 tsp (1 mL) salt, * 1/4 tsp (1 mL) pepper, * 2 eggs, * 2 tsp (18 mL) Dijon mustard, * 1 - 2 cups cooked chickpeas-mashed, *1/4 cup ground walnuts.

PREPARATION: In large skillet, toast oats over medium-high heat, stirring, until golden, about 3 minutes. Transfer to food processor or coffee grinder; pulse until coarsely powdered. In same skillet, heat 1 tbsp (15 mL) of the

oil; cook onion, garlic, thyme, salt and pepper, stirring occasionally, until light golden, about 4 minutes; add to food processor. Add eggs and mustard; pulse until combined. Transfer to bowl; stir in mashed chickpeas and ground walnuts; shape into patties. In skillet, heat remaining oil over medium heat; cook patties, turning once, until crisp and golden, 8 to 10 minutes. Experiment with greens from your spring garden: serve vegy burger on a bun with a choice of freshly-picked lettuce, dill, cilantro, arugula, or beet leaves. Also add tomato, swiss cheese, sliced onions, lime mayonnaise, relish, hummus or Dijon mustard.

Norm Berkner, The Egg Man - Part I by Gordon Ficke

As a boy I tagged along with my dad and frequently we would drop by the 'egg man' Norman Berkner on Fourth Avenue North (Elliott Road). We picked up several 2 1/2 dozen flats of eggs for our prize bull to keep his coat shiny and cracked eggs for our family that would supply us for about a week. Our family ran a tab on a piece of sticky tape that was attached to a low ceiling and was paid whenever we got around to it.

"In January 1946, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan was experiencing a record breaking winter," Norm declared. "We had several days when the thermometer dipped to minus 62 degrees Fahrenheit." Frank, his father, had a severe heart problem and could not stand the cold and phoned his cousin Jack Seltenrich Sr., who lived on 6th Avenue North in Westbank. Seltenrich had just come inside from working in his orchard. "My dad, who was a chef by trade, said he had enough of the cold weather." Norm, an only child, was sixteen at the time. His dad and Kathleen, his mother, sold their house and bought a worn out 1942 Chevrolet pickup truck that was formerly owned by the B/A Oil Company, for a thousand dollars, \$200.00 more than one would pay for a new vehicle. New vehicle production was curtailed during the World War II years, and for two years afterwards, because all manufacturing was dedicated to the war effort. Therefore, anyone wanting to buy a new vehicle had to have a high priority to determine why he or she needed it and the request had to be approved by the federal government. Unfortunately, the Berkners were one of those families who did not qualify for a new truck.

Everything the family owned was loaded into the box of the pickup and they headed west. "Our family had never been to the Okanagan Valley," Berkner admitted. "We knew it was out west somewhere!" The first day on the road two tires blew, but they got as far as Medicine Hat, Alberta. They bought two high-grade tires and got as far as Trail, B.C. the next day. From there they dipped into the U.S. and up into the Okanagan Valley on a Sunday, where they experienced their first heat wave. They met the Seltenrich family and decided to make Westbank their home. "After looking for land in Peachland and Kelowna, Dad found a fouracre lot with an old house, on Fourth Avenue, and purchased it by the following Sunday. On week number two they gathered some lumber and built a small chicken coop. Frank was experienced with raising chickens in Saskatoon and he and his son scoured the back alleys in Kelowna looking for chickens they could purchase. "We knocked on doors and got ten chickens here, fifteen there, and eventually acquired around 200 of them," Norm ascertained. Later, when egg production began they again knocked on doors to try and get customers to buy their eggs. The Berkners found that Penticton was their best market. Supermarkets such as Safeway and IGA, and restaurants, were their best customers. The business grew and Frank and Norman built another building, double the size to accommodate 400 chickens. They maintained 400 chickens for several years and then explored a new avenue of breeding leg-horn chickens. Anstey's Electric Hatchery in Kelowna bought their hatching eggs for a few years. They also bought an incubator and hatched chicks from their own eggs as well. In the early 1950s genetics improved dramatically, particularly through research at the University of California and a new chicken, called the Heinzdorf Nielson (named after the key geneticists) was developed. Through a rigid program of inbreeding and out breeding over multiple generations these new birds produced better quality eggs in a shorter production time. That ended Norm's breeding program, as he couldn't begin to compete with the quality and quantity of eggs this new brand of chicken produced. Story to be continued July/12 Issue.
